Dear Brothers and Sisters,

FROM THE INTENTIONAL INTERIM PASTOR

I am going to begin a two-part article on an interim ministry issue. This issue in interim ministry is a predominant issue. It is the policy of the Lower Susquehanna Synod that the interim pastor should not be considered as a candidate for the call of the church in which they are serving as the interim. I will deal with the first three reasons this month and the last three reasons next month.

First is that interim pastors can enable congregations to deal with their issues better if they have no vested interest in the long-term call to that congregation. The perspective of the interim should always be "What is best for this congregation to engage in during this interim period?"

The second reason involves trust. We signed a covenantal agreement which states that the interim would not pursue the call to the congregation. Changing the "rules of game" may foster distrust in the pastor and congregational leaders who "changed the rules". When an interim pastor becomes a candidate for the open position it changes the agreement upon which the interim pastor was hired. Usually there has been no general congregational involvement in a search process and no congregation vote on the call. Some people may feel betrayed, fooled, or taken advantage of, and distrust may then be part of the climate in which a new long-term relationship will begin.

Third, consideration of the interim pastor as a candidate will short change the search process. When a call committee decides to consider the interim pastor, it will probably short change the search process. The focus will likely be on the personality of the interim pastor rather than on the objective definition of what the congregation is wanting to be in the future and the appropriate skills, strengths and abilities needed in the next pastor. When a call committee decides to find a way to "keep the interim" they can no longer be objective in the crucial task they are performing on behalf of the congregation.

These are the first three rationales given on the non-candidacy of the interim pastor. I know many of you would like to see me stay and I am flattered that you feel that way. But, however flattered I may feel, it is not a good idea for the interim to be called to the congregation. So again, I must again reiterate that it is the policy of the Lower Susquehanna Synod that the interim pastor should not be considered as a candidate for the call of the church in which they are serving as the interim.

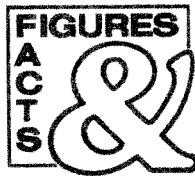
Please do not hesitate to discuss with me if you have any questions or concerns. Remember, my door is always opened to discuss this or any other issue you may during this interim period.

Summary Financial Report

You may have noticed our weekly giving summary is no longer published in our bulletin. Council decided at the April meeting to discontinue this practice and publish a more detailed summary month to date and year to date financial report in our newsletter. The report for May follows. This report will show giving compared to actual expenses as opposed to what we previously reported in the bulletin as giving compared to budget. If you recall our 2011 budget of \$158K was based on salary and benefits for a full-time pastor. While our rate of giving is not meeting this "budgeted amount" our giving is presently ahead of expenses so far in 2011 by \$13K. We do have pension benefits to pay for Pastor Rich since January 1, which will be paid as soon as we receive that billing from the Board of Pensions.

Treasurer's Report as of May 2011 for GENERAL FUND

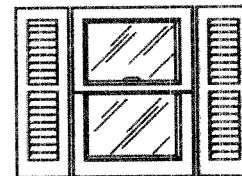

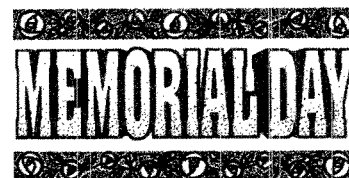

The power of Pentecost

Pentecost started as a Jewish festival commemorating God's giving the Law to the Israelites 50 days after they escaped from slavery in Egypt.

Just days after the risen Jesus ascended to heaven, his (Jewish) disciples gathered in Jerusalem to celebrate Pentecost. But God transformed the occasion by giving them the Holy Spirit, as he'd promised. The disciples saw something like flames among and on them, heard a rushing wind and began speaking in many languages. The pilgrims in Jerusalem heard about Jesus in their native tongues (see Acts 2:1-12).

In Christian churches, Pentecost was once as important as Christmas and Easter. Today, congregations still observe it in special ways, using the color red to symbolize the Holy Spirit's power. Worship services sometimes include hymns, prayers and Scriptures in various tongues. To simulate the original Pentecost experience, congregations may say the Lord's Prayer in several languages at once.

As we celebrate Father's Day, we likely see traits in our dads (or other father figures) that we hope to be known for ourselves: integrity, gentleness, a great sense of humor, a love of learning, a humble spirit.

Freedom of religion

President Franklin D. Roosevelt knew that freedom of religion was a necessary element in a true democracy. He believed that when there is no freedom to worship God as one chooses, democracy is not a reality.

Roosevelt said, "An ordering of society which relegates religion, democracy and good faith among nations to the background can find no place within it for the ideals of the Prince of Peace. The United States rejects such an ordering and retains its ancient faith."

Lutheran Patriots, Our Country and Our Flag

Early Lutherans are an important part of the founding of the United States of America.

- Lutherans were in America seven years before the Pilgrims.
- The first book translated into any Native American language was Luther's Small Catechism.
- The first American flag was made by Sara Austin and the Ladies Aid of Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in Philadelphia.
- Betsy Ross, married in Gloria Dei, is credited with stitching the flag of 13 stars approved by Congress on June 4, 1777. The idea of the 13 horizontal stripes came from another prominent Lutheran, Capt. Abram Markoe.
- Capt. Markoe, a member of the Lutheran Church of Denmark on the Caribbean Island of St. Croix, moved to Philadelphia and formed the first military organization in America in 1774. The Philadelphia Troop of Light Horse presented Markoe a silk flag bearing a knot ties with 13 cords and 13 horizontal striped of blue and silver. The troop carried this flag into battles of the Revolutionary War, and it was seen when Markoe escorted George Washington through Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York to the Connecticut line after Washington was elected commander-in-chief of the army.
- It was a Lutheran Boy who called a Lutheran sexton to ring the Liberty Bell.
- Perhaps it was in part a result of the condescension of the more numerous English, but German Lutherans strongly supported the independence movement in the colonies.
- Washington's army at the Battle of Trent was composed largely of Lutherans, men of German and also Swedish descent.
- The Liberty Bell was hauled from Philadelphia to Allentown by a Lutheran, Frederick Weiser, in 1777. It was hidden from the British under the floor of Zion Lutheran Church.
- The first president of the Continental Congress was a Lutheran, John Hanson, who served until Washington was inaugurated.
- A Lutheran, Michael Hilligas, became the first treasurer of the U.S., serving until Alexander Hamilton took office.
- A Lutheran pastor, the Rev. Frederick Augustus Muhlenberg, was a member of the Continental Congress and the first speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives. Later he was elected again as speaker, this time of the Third Congress. He signed the Bill of Rights.
- Pastor John Peter Muhlenberg, his brother and a devoted supporter of George Washington, left the ministry and quickly rose to the rank of major-general during the Revolutionary War. He was responsible for the Virginia Legislature's passage of the bill establishing religious freedom in 1785. It resulted in the First Amendment to the Constitution.

In honoring America we also honor the foundation of faith and patriotism our Lutheran founders knew would build dedicated citizen.

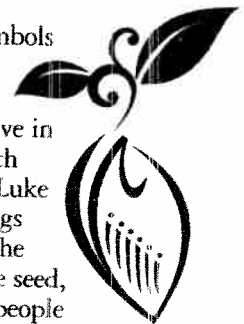

Flower & Food Festival

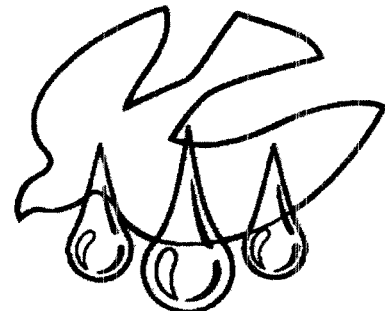

At this time, any and all food and paper products are needed at the Pantry, and as always, the Pantry sincerely thanks the family of Trinity for supporting this vital ministry.



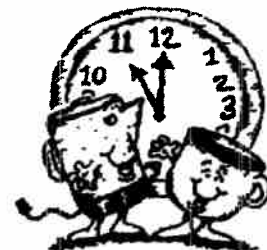

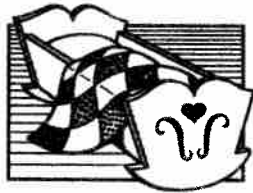

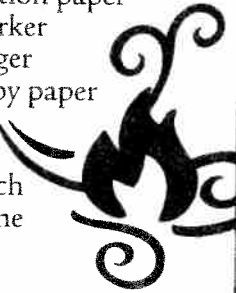

PENTECOST MOBILE

Make this craft as a reminder that God's Holy Spirit is all around you.

What you need:

- Tissue paper (red, yellow, orange), torn into squares
- Plastic transparency
- Craft glue
- Paintbrush
- Construction paper
- Black marker
- Wire hanger
- White copy paper
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Hole punch
- Fishing line



What you do:

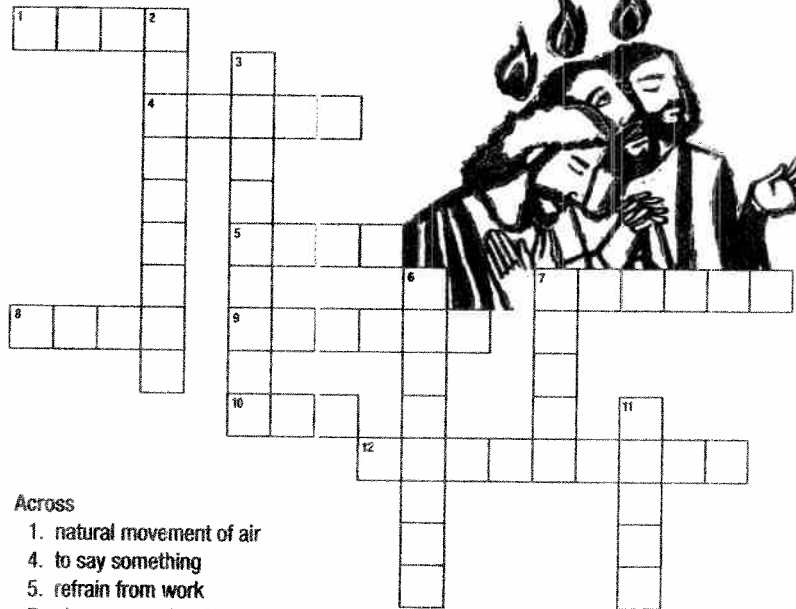
1. Overlap tissue squares as "flames" on the transparency.
2. "Paint" glue (thinned with water) over the squares.
3. Fold construction paper in half. Write out Acts 2:4 at the top, by the fold.
4. Poke the hanger through the middle of the fold.
5. On the white paper, write "Holy Spirit" in English, Spanish (*Espiritu Santo*), French (*L'esprit Saint*), etc.
6. Cut out a flame pattern and trace it on the back of the transparency.
7. Cut out flames and glue the "Holy Spirit" names on them.
8. Thread fishing line through a hole atop each flame and tie flames onto the hanger.
